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The Story of Eutychus

Growing up, I remember my parents telling me the story of Eutychus. I even have a vague memory of a song of Eutychus falling out of a window and Paul coming down and picking him up. Yet through all the remembrance I have of Eutychus, I have not found many lessons, principles, Bible studies, or sermons written about Eutychus. I do know from experience the more I overlook something in Scripture, the more gold is waiting to be dug. I am thankful to a certain secretary for sharing some notes she had taken from a study that helped me spark a renewed interest in the account of Eutychus.

The Narrative

There is much to be learned simply from the snapshot that Luke gives in Acts 20:7-12 about how, when, and where the first disciples gathered to worship the risen Lord. Verse 7 says that they gathered on the first day of the week. This would have been Sunday, the "Lord's Day" on account of the resurrection. From the previous verse we find that though Paul was in a hurry to reach Jerusalem by Pentecost (20:16), he decided to stay seven days to be with them on "the first day of the week" (v. 7). One of the stated purposes for the gathering was to "break bread" (v. 7). This is significant in a sense greater than partaking of an ordinary meal (since Paul was their for seven days, surely they would have broken bread at meal times). The "breaking of bread" is a synecdoche for partaking of the Lord's Supper. Here we see an example of the disciples taking this Lord's Supper. We know that Jesus commanded the disciples to eat of the unleavened bread and to drink the fruit of the vine (Matt. 26:26-30; I Cor. 11:23-26). We also have an approved example of the body of believers coming together for the express purpose "to break bread" (taking the Lord's Supper). One such young Christian who partook of the Supper was Eutychus no doubt.

Again, though Paul was in a hurry, he was zealous for preaching and teaching. Luke says that he "continued his message till midnight" (v. 7). For the Roman world there was no significance of Sunday in their week. It was a normal day of work. We cannot know all the details from Luke's account of when Paul preached, but some early Christian accounts say that the disciples would meet very early on Sundays to worship and then go to secular work at the conclusion. Either Paul started very early in the day and preached a marathon (which is possible, see Restoration Movement sermons) or Eutychus may have come after his work and was gathering with the brethren in the third-story house. Luke gives some explanation of the situation as to why Eutychus found himself falling out of the window: "there were many lamps in the upper room," Paul was "continuing his speech till midnight," and "Eutychus was sinking into a deep sleep" while sitting "in a window" of "third story" (v. 7, 8). I cannot help to think Luke had a little bit of humor with this account because no doubt there were other stories he could have told from Paul's travels. I guess, I am not the only preacher to go overtime just a little. It seems Eutychus is the first example (though probably not approved, especially when sitting in a third-story window) of someone sleeping in church service.

It is humorous only because the conclusion of the narrative finds a positive ending. Paul raced down to pick up Eutychus from the ground. Although the young man was dead, Paul, "fell on him and embracing him said, 'do not trouble yourselves, for his life is in him³⁹ (v. 10). Eutychus revived and came back to the brethren, eating and staying till daybreak the next day (v. 11).

Lessons From Eutychus

Though we only have a few short verses dedicated to Eutychus, we can gain some valuable spiritual lessons. Eutychus had positioned himself between the light of the room from the brethren, and the dark night of the world sitting in the window. Physically, this turned out dangerous for him. Spiritually speaking, trying to tow the line between light and darkness is a dangerous place to be, hazardous for a fall.

Eutychus also found himself falling into a deep sleep. Though I'm sure the preaching of Paul was not the problem, Eutychus was lulled into sleep by the haze of the light and the droning on of the preacher. It takes effort on the part of the listener to stay engaged in the doctrine, examples, and principles being taught in a class or espoused in a sermon. We can become sluggish when we are tired and lose our focus when we are surrounded by other Christian lights and become complacent, thinking we've heard this sermon before, this lesson is not for me, and succumb to the desires of the flesh. Many young adults have slept through the alarm clock of Sunday morning worship because their spirit was willing but the flesh was too weak. "What fellowship has righteousness with lawlessness? And what communion has light with darkness?" (II Corinthians 6:14).

When Eutychus fell, he took a nasty fall from the third-story building. No doubt the young man was taken up dead. How many young people have committed themselves to the Lord, put on Christ in baptism, and soon after fallen away? Eutychus makes us think of the nasty temptations our young people are assaulted with by the world. Drugs, alcohol, parties, and pre-marital sex are all things the devil uses to entice even the most dedicated of young Christians. In the denominational world, most believe in "once saved always saved." Yet Eutychus teaches us, spiritually speaking, that one can be in the light and yet still fall into darkness. "For if we sin willfully after we have received the knowledge of the truth there no longer remains a sacrifice for sins" (Heb. 10:26). (See also the example of Simon Acts 8:18-24)

Though he was taken up dead, we see one final lesson the account of Eutychus brings: one who has fallen can have life again. The text says Paul embraced him. How many Christians who have fallen could start the road of recovery when they are embraced by faithful brethren who deeply care about them. When Eutychus was restored to life, Luke says about the brethren, "they were not a little comforted" when they received him back alive (v. 12). "Brethren, if anyone among you wanders from the truth, and someone turns him back, let him know that he who

Women of the Word

How Full is Your Fruit Bowl?

In the nineteenth century many wealthy European and American families displayed a fruit bowl in their homes for visitors and dinner guests. These bowls were often made of ornate cut glass and contained the best fruits available. Reading this history reminded me of what the apostle Paul says about the "fruit of the Holy Spirit" in Galatians 5:22-23. Paul lists nine characteristics that every Christian should work to attain. These are:

1. <u>LOVE</u>: Love is not just a warm feeling but a willingness to sacrifice for one another just as Jesus sacrificed His life for us (Romans 5:6-8).

2. **JOY**: Joy is deeper than happiness. It is a profound and delightful rejoicing that comes from knowing and serving God (Philippians 2:17-18).

3. **PEACE**: Peace is the ability to remain calm in difficult times. "Be anxious for nothing but in all things through prayer and supplication make your requests known unto God and the peace of God will guard your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:7).

- 4. **PATIENCE**: Patience is being "completely humble and gentle, bearing with one another in love" (Ephesians 4:2).
- 5. **KINDNESS**: Kindness is making the effort to be "kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other just as Christ forgave you" (Ephesians 4:32).

6. <u>GOODNESS</u>: Goodness is living your life with good morals and motives; "let us do good to all people, especially those who belong to the family of God" (Galatians 6:10).

- 7. **FAITHFULNESS**: Faithfulness includes being loyal, trustworthy, and dependable. James says, "Blessed is the one who perseveres under trial" (James 1:12).
- 8. <u>**GENTLENESS**</u>: Gentleness includes softness in speech and touch among other qualities. "A soft answer turns away wrath but a harsh word stirs up anger" (Proverbs 15:1).

9. **SELF CONTROL**: Self-control includes disciplining yourself in mind and body. Paul says, "But I discipline my body and keep it under control" (First Corinthians 9:27). The wise man confirms, "A man without self-control is like a city broken into and left without walls" (Proverbs 25:28).

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
