Why You Should Attend PTP

Polishing the Pulpit (PTP) is a lectureship/workshop that occurs annually in Sevierville, Tennessee. PTP takes place the third week in August each summer. There were roughly 700 sessions and around 200 speakers on the program this year. More than 4,500 Christians were present during this week of spiritual renewal as Christians came from all over the world for this spiritual feast. This is a great event that is overseen by the elders of the church of Christ in Jacksonville, Alabama. If you have the chance next summer, this is something you should consider attending, even if you can only make the weekend sessions. It would be well worth the trip. The theme of PTP is always: Renew, Refresh, and Recharge. Those who attend experience all three of these things (Isa. 40:29-31).

Renew

The Bible speaks of the mercies of God being new every morning (Lam. 3:22-23). When someone obeys the gospel he or she is a new creature in Jesus Christ (2 Cor. 5:17). However, the Christian still needs times of renewal in his or her life on a regular basis. We take vacations from our jobs and the normalcy of life to be renewed in zeal, purpose, and focus during the year. PTP allows for spiritual renewal as one can get away from the routine of everyday life and spend time with several thousand Christians studying, praying, and praising God together. Not only is the Christian renewed after spending a week at PTP, but friendships are also formed and renewed every year as you are able to see so many friends at once that you do not see throughout the year (Phil. 1:3-5). When you leave a program like PTP, your dedication to God is renewed as you have been encouraged and enlightened. There is a desire to renew your passion for studying God's Word (Ezr. 7:10). There is a renewed commitment to prayer and communion with God (Acts 2:42). A renewed focus on reaching the lost is kindled as you are privileged to hear many heart-stirring lessons on evangelism (Mk. 16:15). Those who attend PTP are renewed, not by the human agents that God works through, but by the God of heaven who touches their hearts through the proclamation of his word (1 Thess. 2:13).

Refresh

Paul pleaded with Philemon to refresh his heart in the Lord and this is what PTP accomplished for those who were privileged to attend (Philemon 20). The world seems to be getting darker every day, and sometimes Christians can become discouraged at what we see around us. A program like PTP refreshes the Christian as one sees there are others around the world engaged in the same spiritual warfare and fighting the same battle (1 Pet. 5:8-9). Paul told the Corinthians that we are all being changed into the same image by the Spirit of the Lord (2 Cor. 3:18). Passages that we often hear and are familiar with are preached from by different preachers, and there is a fresh perspective on things we may have overlooked. There are sessions where men can attend and become a part of a mock eldership as they attempt to solve problems and are introduced to the types of things elders deal with. Countless sessions are available for women to attend and hear other women speakers teach lessons on being a godly wife, balancing work and motherhood, and ways to keep balance with Bible study and prayer with a busy schedule. PTP provides special lessons for those who are college-age and teens. There is even childcare provided for toddlers. There are great lessons on child rearing and discipline, health and fitness, how to study the Bible, and many lessons on marriage and family. It is refreshing to hear different speakers from all over preach in different ways and yet herald the same gospel message (Jn. 17:20-21). As Jude told Christians to contend for the faith that was once for all delivered, PTP shows that there are many today who are still contending for that faith (Jude 3). We all need to be refreshed from time to time. We may find ourselves going through the motions spiritually or failing to maximize our talents for the Lord. Being refreshed at an event like PTP will help to revive our spirit.

Recharge

Jesus was the busiest preacher that ever lived. He went about doing good, healing, and preaching the good news (Acts 10:38). Yet Jesus would often get away from the crowds and rest so that he could be recharged and regain his strength. God does not get tired and does not need to be recharged, but we do (Isa. 40:28). Jesus once told his disciples to get away from the crowds and to rest because they had not even been able to eat (Mk. 6:31). Though our schedules are crammed and every minute of our day is filled with requirements and deadlines, we need times of rest so that we can recharge. PTP, though it is a program that is filled with speakers and sessions, provides an occasion for Christians to spiritually recharge our batteries. Those who teach Bible class every quarter and are constantly involved in the work of the local congregation may feel that they are on the brink of burnout. However, after attending PTP, the Christian is renewed spiritually, filled with new ideas and desires to do more for the Lord (1 Cor. 15:58). Like a cell phone that must be charged daily if it will be of any use to its owner, there are times when Christians must be recharged if we would do any good for our owner in heaven. The recharging for the Christian takes place as he or she is plugged into God's Word and God's people. PTP provides opportunities where elders can be recharged as they are challenged but also encouraged that they are doing the best work in the world. Deacons find out how they can better serve and are introduced to the many ways others effectively serve throughout the church. Christians are recharged as fellowship, hugs, and laughter are shared by many throughout the week.

Conclusion

A person does not have to attend PTP in order to go to heaven. There are many lectureships and workshops that take place locally that provide encouragement to Christians throughout the year. However, no Christian will make it to heaven who is not constantly renewed, refreshed, and recharged. The dates for PTP in 2018 are August 17-23. I would love to see many from SFA attend and enjoy this spiritual feast together. I realize for many this is the time when school is about to begin and this could make attending difficult, but even coming just for the weekend would be profitable. If you are able, work PTP into your schedule for 2018, you will not regret it. The world is spiraling out of control and many who have built their lives on sinking sand are sinking fast. Christians have placed their hope in Jesus Christ and are resting on the solid foundation of faith in him (Mt. 7:24-27). PTP not only polishes the pulpits of preachers throughout the world, but it also works to polish the lives of members who attend.

A Regular Day's Lesson on "Wine"

While in Ghana, West Africa, our mission team was leaving a rain forest national park. At the gate were a few street vendors. One of them came to the front passenger side window holding up bottles of what he called "palm wine." When the preacher in that front seat told him we did not drink alcoholic beverages, the vendor responded, "This is not fermented. The fermented bottles are over there," pointing to his table a few feet from the edge of the road. Almost immediately my mind went to John 2:1-11, where Jesus turned water into wine. It must always be remembered that the main point of that miracle is to show Jesus' power over nature, but since the passage is often used by those seeking to justify their drinking alcoholic beverages, an observation about "wine" is in order. As even that Ghanaian street vendor acknowledged, "wine"



does not automatically refer to an intoxicating beverage, even in Bible times (see Guy N. Woods' *A Commentary on the Gospel of John*, page 52). The context must determine its meaning. For example, the Lord made a comparison through Isaiah with "the new wine [that] is found in the cluster" (Isaiah 65:8). Obviously, naturally plump, juicy grapes are not intoxicating! It is true that in the non-refrigerant times of the Bible, grape juice could not be well preserved and would start to ferment shortly after it was stored, but even then, the alcoholic content was minimal, which is why the injunctions not to consume significant amounts are in place *(continued below)*

(continued from above) (Proverbs 23:30; 1 Timothy 3:8; Titus 2:3). Jesus' turning water into wine is not justification for alcoholic beverages today. Would Jesus, who always "went about doing good" (Acts 10:38), be the direct cause of getting people intoxicated? "Alcohol continues to stand the test of time as a frequent and reliable source of ruin" (Rick Kenyon, *Do You Understand Biblical Morality?*, page 166). Why even dabble in something with the destructive influence of alcohol? "Wine is a mocker, Strong drink is a brawler, And whoever is led astray by it is not wise" (Proverbs 20:1). May we always accept Jesus' authority over our lives as He is sovereign over creation, rather than using His turning water into wine as "justification" for that which Biblical wisdom clearly condemns (Proverbs 23:29-35). Even a Ghanaian street vendor acknowledges that "wine" does not always mean an intoxicating beverage! ❤️ *Brian*
