# **Phoebe: An Exemplary Servant**

In Romans 16:1-2, Paul wrote, "I commend to you Phoebe our sister, who is a servant of the church in Cenchrea, that you may receive her in the Lord in a manner worthy of the saints, and assist her in whatever business she has need of you; for indeed she has been a helper of many and of myself also." Although some people make way too much out of these verses (i.e., by making her an official "deaconess"), this commendation of Phoebe is very remarkable. Her name means "bright," or "radiant," and she is the only person named Phoebe in Scripture.

# Was Phoebe a "Deaconess"?

One of the main reasons this question is even asked is because the word translated "servant" is from the same word (diakonos, διάκονος) from which "deacon" derives. (The other main reason is that people want to force something that would appear to negate Paul's teaching on the role of women in Second Timothy 2:8-15.) This word translated "servant" refers to one who renders service of whatever kind; "one who executes the commands of another; esp. of a master; a servant, attendant, minister" (J. H. Thayer, Greek-English Lexicon of the New Testament, 138). The form of diakonos used here is accusative singular masculine (diakonon). Some more modern lexicons may describe this as an "accusative feminine singular common," which is very misleading and seems to reflect a progressive attitude meant to keep up with the times rather than being true to the original language. In biblical Greek, unlike English but common in most contemporary languages, all nouns have a specific gender (masculine, feminine, or neuter). There are two kinds of gender in languages: "lexical gender," which has nothing to do with the meaning of a word (but is used for pronoun antecedents, adjectives, etc.), and "natural gender," which does affect the meaning of words (e.g., "girl" is feminine gender). "Servant" (diakonos) is masculine, but that does not mean it only applies to men and/or deacons in the local church! Those same ("progressive" reflecting) lexicons will say in Romans 15:8, where diakonos refers to Jesus, that it is "accusative masculine singular common." Adjectives can change gender to match words they modify(cf. he, she, or it), but, unlike an adjective, diakonos is a noun and does not change gender!

While some like to see Phoebe as an official "deaconess" of the local church and seek to justify such a position today, there is no biblical evidence that suggests that. *Diakonos* simply refers to a servant. *Diakonos* (also translated "minister" and "servant") occurs twenty-nine times in the Greek text, UBS4 (Mt. 20:26; 22:13; 23:11; Mk. 9:35; 10:43; Jn. 2:5, 9; 12:26; Rom. 13:4 [twice]; 15:8; 16:1; 1 Cor. 3:5; 2 Cor. 3:6; 6:4; 11:15 [twice], 23; Gal. 2:17; Eph. 3:7; 6:21; Phil. 1:1; Col. 1:7, 23, 25; 4:7; 1 Tim. 3:8, 12; 4:6), and in one other place in the Received Text (1 Thes. 3:2). *Diakonos* is used of a king's servants (Mt. 22:13), servants at a wedding

feast (Jn. 2:5), civil government (Rom. 13:4), Jesus Christ (Rom. 15:8), Apollos (1 Cor. 3:5), the apostles (2 Cor. 3:6), servants of Satan (2 Cor. 11:15), Paul (Col. 1:23), Tychicus (Eph. 6:21), and Timothy (1 Thes. 3:2). According to the general meaning of the word, all Christians are to fulfil the idea of *diakonos*! In the local church, however, there is also a "special" kind of servant, appropriately translated "deacon" in only three New Testament verses. The first occurrence is found where Paul writes, "To all the saints in Christ Jesus who are in Philippi, with the bishops and deacons" (Phil. 1:1). In this context, "saints" (which refers to all Christians) are distinct from "bishops" and "deacons." While it is true that all bishops and deacons are saints, all saints are not bishops or deacons. This verse also shows that deacons work with "bishops," also known as "elders" (Titus 1:5-6) or "shepherds" (1 Pet. 5:4). The other two verses are in contexts where qualifications of deacons are given (1 Tim. 3:8, 12). Of the thirty times this word occurs, only three of them refer to the special servants of the local church called "deacons." Why do people not consider any of the other individuals identified with the word *diakonos* as an official "deacon" in the local church, but insist that Phoebe was? If "deaconesses" were intended to be part of the church's organization, then where are the qualifications? Some say First Timothy 3:11, but that context seems to refer to the wives of elders and/or deacons. Some may say First Timothy 5:9-10, but that context refers to widows who were supported by the church.

# **Phoebe Was a Valuable Servant of God**

Although she was not a female counterpart to the special servant "deacons" in the local church as per the qualifications of First Timothy 3:8-13, Phoebe was, like many women today, a valuable servant of the Most High God and of the church as per the general meaning of the term *diakonos*. According to R. C. H. Lenski's *Interpretation of St. Paul's Epistle to the Romans*, she could very well have been the carrier of this letter to the Romans. Lenski notes her commendation being placed first with mention of no other person "assumes simultaneous arrival of Phoebe and Paul's letter in Rome" (898).

Regardless of her exact role, Phoebe was a faithful Christian who was a great asset to the local church and to the Lord. "Our sister" indicates she was family in Christ with Paul and the Romans (cf. "brethren," Rom. 7:1, 4). Since she was from "Cenchrea," a village seaport east of Corinth, the Romans would not immediately recognize her. Thus, Paul told them to "receive her in the Lord in a manner worthy of the saints, and assist her in whatever business she has need of you" (Rom. 16:2a). The word translated "receive [welcome, ESV]" means to wait for, expect; receive, welcome; accept (Phil. 2:29). They were to welcome her in a way consistent with Christianity (cf. Rom. 15:7). The Romans were to assist Phoebe in whatever way they could because she herself helped many people, including Paul. The word translated "helper [succourer, KJV; patron, ESV]" occurs only here in the New Testament, and indicates Phoebe was a good helper, friend, and patron to members of the local church and even to her community and beyond (cf. Mt. 5:13-16).

# Conclusion

Women are held in high esteem by God (cf. Mt. 1:3, 5, 16; Heb. 11:11, 31, 35; Jas. 2:25), and His people should also hold them in such esteem! Not only are women valuable in the home (1 Tim. 1:5; 3:15; Titus 2:3-5; 1 Pet. 3:1-6), but their value is also incalculable to the betterment of the church. the body of Christ (2 Cor. 12:12-27). Let us not go beyond what is written in our belief and practice of the role of women or any other biblical topic (1 Cor. 4:6). There is plenty in what is written that tells us to love and honour faithful women, like Phoebe, in the church (cf. 1 Pet. 2:17)!
